Women Peace and Security

The seminar will give at first a brief overview of the United Nations and central resolutions and documents concerning the complex "Women, Peace and Security", the so called WPS-Agenda. Within the second part of the seminar, we will analyse and discuss the implementation of resolution 1325. As the resolution entails the adoption of National Actions Plans, we will also analyse selected examples of them.

Constitutional Democracy

This seminar examines in its first part the preconditions and the origin of a legitimate constitutional order; the second half focuses on civil rights such as freedom of expression and freedom of religion and on procedures such as reverse discrimination and judicial review. All these issues will be discussed in a comparative perspective.

Contemporary German History: FRG and GDR

Lecture on the political history of the Federal Republic and the German Democrat Republic from the Occupation Period to the unified Germany since 1990.
